In the next few weeks some of us will be going back into Church to worship together – and some of us will be staying at home for now. For those who do go back to the Church building, you might be worshipping in a Church that is not your usual one. Even if it is the same building, some changes may have been made. But there is one thing that we must remember, whether we are staying at home for the foreseeable future, or beginning to make our way back into a world where changes have been put into place. The Church is wherever God's people are loving, where all are forgiven and start once again, where all are accepted, whatever their background, whatever their past and whatever their pain.

The Church is wherever God's people are seeking to reach out and touch folk wherever they are -- conveying the Gospel, its joy and its comfort, to challenge, refresh, and excite and inspire.

The Church is wherever God's people are praising, knowing we're wanted and loved by our Lord.
The Church is where we as Christ's followers are trying to live and to share out the good news of God.

Usually at this point in our service we hear one or two readings – sometimes in an all age service we like to listen differently. Today's reading reminds us of several different parts of the gospel which all have the same theme –and there is a response in this reading so you will have to listen carefully.

When I say: "And all the people said

You respond "Oh no – not her/ him"

... One day as Jesus was travelling he met a Roman Centurion whose servant was ill. He begged Jesus to make him better. Nobody liked the Romans because they were occupying the country and telling everyone what to do. And all the people said...

But Jesus said "Yes – even him" and spoke to the Centurion, and made his servant well.

... One day as Jesus was travelling he met a tax collector. He was a little man who had climbed into a tree to see better. He wasn't a good man. He took a bit more money from people than he should and kept it for himself. And all the people said...

But Jesus said "Yes – even him" and talked to him and listened to him and went round to his house for tea.

...One day as Jesus was travelling he met an old woman who had been ill many years. She touched Jesus' cloak and asked to be healed. Everyone thought she was unclean and disgusting. And all the people said...

But Jesus said, "Yes – even her" and healed her just like she asked.

All through his work, people came up to Jesus again and again and again, and the people often said "Oh no – not them"

But Jesus always said, "Yes – even her, and even him, because God welcomes everyone."

You might like to think about:

What did the Roman Centurion, the tax collector and the old woman have in common?

What do these different stories tell us about Jesus?

What do you think they might tell us about what Churches ought to be like?

Can you draw a picture or make a model, or may be write a poem about what a really good Church community might look like?
